

The Great Crowd of Witnesses

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith"

Hebrews 12:1-2 (NRSV)

This month I invite you to read Hebrews 11:29-12:3. These readings encompasses a parade of the heroes of faith that began in the previous verses of Chapter 11. Some names are familiar and expected in this litany of people who lived by faith – Moses and his life of faith, the people of Israel who trusted in God and crossed the Red Sea, as well as Joshua and the battle of Jericho where the walls come tumbling down. There are even a few surprises in this litany of names: Rahab, the prostitute, who welcomed the spies of Israel prior to the fall of Jericho. This is a list of faithful men and women who lived out their lives despite their circumstances.

- 1. Read over the list of names in Hebrews 11:32-34. What do you know about them?
- 2. Who are some unlikely "heroes of the faith" in your life?
- 3. Who are the heroes in your faith story?

The author of Hebrews continues to hold up examples of faithfulness of the heroes of the past by naming some of the suffering, torment, and persecution they endured. (See Hebrews 11:35-38) These graphic experiences point to the faithfulness of those who endured hardship and serve as examples for the believer. We think of them as witnesses of the faith. The word in Greek for witness is martyria, from which is derived martyr.

- 4. Whom do you think suffers for the faith today?
- 5. How can their experiences strengthen our faith?

After the litany of Chapter 11, the letter to the Hebrews reaches a summary conclusion. "Therefore...the case for faithfulness has been made." The author enlists the strongest of words to bring the message home. "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith..." (Hebrews 12:1-2 NRSV)

The journey of faith is not a sprint to the finish line, but it is rather a marathon to be run with perseverance. It requires us to be lean, to discard all the things that weigh us down and inhibit our running. The focal point of the race – the goal to which we strive – is Jesus. Jesus ran the race before us (the pioneer of our faith). Jesus ran it in absolute obedience to God's will (the perfecter of our faith).

- 6. Does the image of the life of faith as a race speak to you? Explain.
- 7. What does it mean to "look to Jesus" in the race?
- 8. How are you inspired to spread the gospel for future generations?

We do not run the race of faith alone. We are surrounded by a "great cloud of witnesses." All the names included in the litany of heroes in Chapter 11 - all the faithful people who have lived and died trusting in the promises of God - all are in the grandstand, cheering us on.

We have Jesus, who lived the life of faithfulness and obedience to God – the great high priest, the perfect sacrifice – "who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:2)

- 9. How might enduring the cross become a source of joy for Christ?
- 10. How might we share our faith with others?
- 11. How might we be the light of Christ in the lives of others?

Each Sunday, we are united with all the faithful of every place and time. As we hear God's word and share in the Lord's Supper, we are strengthened by the great cloud of witnesses for the journey of faith.

- 12. Who do you hope and expect to be in that great cloud of witnesses?
- 13. What does it mean to you to have their support as you follow Jesus?

Prayer

We give you thanks, gracious God, for the great cloud of witnesses, for those who taught us the faith and serve as examples in our journey of faith and life. Focus our eyes on Jesus to lead the way. Help us to leave a legacy of faith for those who come after us. Amen.

The Stewardship of Giving Thanks

Do you remember the last hand-written note you received? Writing notes used to be standard practice, but today we turn to email, text, and social media to thank and communicate with others. We email newsletters chock-full of information, send reminders via text (often with acronyms and poor grammar), and point people to websites with calendars and electronic forms. More and more churches are sharing lessons and news through video, audio, and photos online to communicate with their flock and promote their mission. We have more communication channels than ever before, but is something lost in all the options?

Like me, you may have been the recipient of a handwritten thank you from Pastor Jennifer. What a difference it is from all the electronic shortcuts we experience every day!

People often engage with church where they feel like they have a real and authentic connection. Certainly, we are in the business of building relationships with Jesus Christ, but one of the ways we do that is through authentic relationships with fellow church members. We have worship and fellowship gatherings for instance, to help build those bonds, but how do we build or maintain those relationships through our communications? Hand-written notes! Cut through the technological clutter with a simple, yet meaningful handwritten note that tells the recipient you care enough about them to slow down long enough to share your appreciation. This simple act of giving thanks via a hand-written note will endear the recipient to you and will strengthen your relationship. Sending thank you notes to other members warms the community spirit and the bonds Christ has called us to build. It is part of our discipleship. Not sure what to write? Thank them for singing in the choir, ushering, giving or leading Sunday School, or bringing the refreshments for Sunday. If you can't come up with something specific, then thank them for being part of the church. The notes do not need to be long, but push yourself to be as specific and genuine as possible. Giving thanks to church members for the ways they contribute to and enhance your church through a simple hand-written thank you note will build a stronger and more authentic relationship between you, and it may encourage them to pick up the practice. Think of it as "Stewardship of Giving Thanks." We give thanks to God and we give thanks for each other.
