

President's Report

Happy Summer! I hope everyone is finding time to rest and recharge during these long warm days!

As we wind down from the celebratory season of Easter and enter into the long green season of Pentecost, we at Our Saviour's continue our journey of transition. I marvel at all the CHANGES we have experienced over the last few years as a congregation and as individuals; our growth, our challenges, our successes, our flexibility. Recently, I heard discussions about change at the 2025 Pacifica Synod Assembly. The theme, *In a New Boat*, aligned perfectly with our surroundings at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Dana Point; a beautiful sanctuary that included a boat docked close to the pulpit just for our event! We could hear the seagulls, feel the ocean breeze and almost taste the salt in the air as we gathered to worship and work. But more importantly, the theme spoke to me of CHANGE. Specifically, how our mission to share the Good News of Jesus Christ in the world does not change, but perhaps the ways in which the Good News is shared may look different than it has in the past. Maybe the vessel changes. Maybe the boat is more nimble and able to reach those adrift at sea. Maybe the boat is hydrodynamic and able to pierce through the storms of our everyday lives. As we continue to discern the ministry at OSLC may we prayerfully consider the inevitable changes in the world around us, our never changing mission to share the Good News and the boundless Agape love that comes from our Lord Jesus Christ.

In considering new and different ways to effectively continue our ministry in the ever-changing city of Orange, five members from the OSLC Council, along with other church councils, met with Bishop Dave and Rev. Tom Goellrich at the Synod Office to learn about a potential new model for ministry in the Pacifica Synod. We spent two hours on a Saturday morning hearing about Ministry Cooperatives, a model that is currently being used in Northeast Pennsylvania Synod. We had time to ask questions, brainstorm ideas, and share concerns. Those of us who attended shared the information we learned at our June Council meeting. By majority vote, the council decided to work with the Pacifica Synod to form a Ministry Cooperative. Therefore, we will be working with the Bishop and DEM to form a Cooperative and put together the details of a functioning model over the next couple of months. We will be sharing the details with you, the congregation, along the way. There will be opportunities for discussions and questions, but the basic idea of the Ministry Co-op is a group of congregations that share a set group of leaders [made up of Pastor(s), Deacon(s), and Lay Minister(s)]. The Ministry start would be scheduled for 2026.

SOME INFO ABOUT MINISTRY COOPERATIVES

INITIAL TIMELINE:

JULY 2025 – Congregations put their name in to join a Co-Op.
 AUGUST 2025 – DECEMBER 2025 – Construction of Congregation Teams
 2026 – Ministry Begins

THE PLAYERS:

CONGREGATIONS—Ministry Co-ops can be large or small congregations, those currently with full-time staff as well as those in a pastoral vacancy or who typically only have part-time staff. Ministry Co-ops can also happen with Ecumenical partners as well as ELCA congregations. Ideally, there will be a handful of congregations within 30 or so minutes of one another.

PASTORS – ordained to Word and Sacrament
DEACONS- ordained to Word and Service
LAY MINISTERS

SOME OF THE BENEFITS OF MINISTRY CO-OPS:

The Ministry Co-Ops promote vitality for all the congregations by providing:

- A collective pool of resources to support full-time pastors and deacons, in a time of clergy shortage.
- A training structure for lay ministers and interns allowing for a natural flow of trained leadership some of whom may discern a call to public, rostered ministry.
- A means for staff and members to practice teamwork in a familiar network as they will have to rely on one another to fully support and sustain ministry.
- Built-in support for re-identifying values, mission, and community in the wake of an ever-changing landscape.
- A deeper and broader training and accountability structure for councils, officers, committees, staff, rostered ministers, and lay ministers.
- Insight into the Church universal as congregations partner together for the sake of the Gospel, reaching beyond their individual doors and into the broader community.
- Increased opportunities for worship, Bible study, small groups, service, fellowship, other faith practices.

OSLC Property Update

Our campus continues to require ongoing care and maintenance to stay in good condition. As reported in the May newsletter, three major repairs have already been completed in 2025. The roof leak over Moreland Hall was repaired at a cost of \$5,000. A water leak in the parking lot was repaired at a cost of \$3,000 and our solar system was repaired at a cost of \$900.

Now, our next important project is repairing and updating the parking lot. We need to relocate our handicapped parking spaces to be compliant with ADA requirements. The three spaces in front of Moreland Hall and the two against the Lomita wall will be moved to the center of the lot, closer to the church. New signage on posts will be installed. The major cracks in the asphalt will be filled and then two coats of seal will be applied. After that, white parking lot lines will be repainted, plus about twenty car stops will be replaced as that is how many are falling part. We received two bids for the work and selected Cal State Paving, the company that previously repaired the water leak. The total cost for this project is \$25,500.

Our church budget for 2025 had allocated \$25,000 for maintenance. To date with the three major expenses, we have spent \$12,000 which leaves \$13,000 for other property maintenance. Since the parking lot repair is going to be \$25,500, we are hoping to raise another \$12,500. Steve has talked about this during church announcements for the last Sundays in June and, wow, \$5,500 has been given as of Sunday June 22.

Thank you to those that have given so far. Hopefully, additional funds will be received in the coming weeks for this effort. If you'd like to support this effort, please make your check payable to the church and include "Parking Lot Repair/Maintenance" in the memo line.

A note of good news is Our roof loan with the Mission Investment Fund is down to \$31,000. According to Bob Hunter, we are on track to pay it off within 7 years or less.




